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A history of Bifrons mansion house | Kent Archaeological ...

The history of Bifrons House itself actually begins about 1607, when John Bargrave (also shown as Bargar), of a prosperous family which lived in the neighbouring parish of Bridge, began construction of the known house. (There may have been an earlier house, demolished to make way for this one.)

Bifrons and Beyond

For more than 300 years life in Patricbourne would have been dominated by Bifrons house. There was probably a Tudor house on the site which was demolished to make way for a fine Jacobean mansion built by a John Bargar of Bridge in the early 1600s. In 1694 a John Taylor bought the house and established a particularly fine garden.

History of Patricbourne - Bekesbourne with Patricbourne

This makes it probable that he was the John Taylor 'of Hackney' who in 1694 subscribed £2,000 to the Bank of England. In September 1694 Taylor purchased the estate of Bifrons in Kent and presumably made this his main residence, for the baptisms of his son Upton (1696) and daughter Hannah (1700) were recorded in the parish of Patricbourne.

The house remained in Edward's hands, but he moved to a nearby estate and leased Bifrons to John Loftus, the second Marquess of Ely in 1825. The Marquess was the first tenant and lived there 2 years between 1825-1827. In 1828, the house was let Anne Isabella (Annabella) Byron, baroness, Lord Byron's estranged wife, and her daughter Ada.

In the House Gascoyne regularly supported the Government; but, as an old Grenvillian, voted with the Opposition for making permanent Grenville's Election Act, 25 Feb. 1774. As the Parliament of 1768 was drawing to an end, the question of a seat for Gascoyne arose once more: the arrangement at Weobley was for the one Parliament only.

On his death in 1791 the Bamber estates descended to his son Bamber (1758-1824), M.P. for Liverpool 1780-96, who cut off the entail, pulled down the house of Bifrons, and sold the site and park. His daughter and heiress married the second Marquis of Salisbury , who took the name of Gascoyne before that of Cecil, and became possessed of the Bamber property, worth, it is said, £12000 a year ...

The family of Bargrave (or Bargar as it often appears in the earlier records) were yeomen at various places in east Kent in the 16th century. One of them, Robert Bargar (d. 1600) of Bridge, was also a tanner, and became sufficiently prosperous to send several of his sons to university or the inns of court, thus beginning their transition to gentry status.

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
