Hospice: Under the Medicare hospice benefit, all equipment and supplies related to the terminal diagnosis are provided and covered 100 percent. The need for equipment, oxygen and other products is determined by the patient's palliative plan of care. Home health: For home healthcare patients, medical equipment and supplies must be ordered by their physician and are covered 80 percent when ...

Home hospice care. Most people get hospice care at home. People who live in places like residential facilities, certain types of assisted living, or nursing homes can get hospice care there, too. If hospice care is needed for a person living in one of these facilities, it may be considered in-home care since the facility is the patient's home.

How and Where Is Hospice Care Provided and How Is It Paid For?

Level 1: Routine Home Care - Routine home care is the basic level of care under the hospice benefit. It is covered for homebound individuals with Medicare part A and B who are under the care of a doctor who has specified the services are needed.

Levels of Hospice Care as Defined by Medicare

However, hospice care is also available at hospitals, nursing homes, assisted living facilities and dedicated hospice facilities. No matter where hospice care is provided, sometimes it's necessary to be admitted to a hospital. For instance, if a symptom can't be managed by the hospice care team in a home setting, a hospital stay might be needed.
